In connection with the Attachment conference, the orchestra will perform portions of Hector Berlioz' famous *Symphonie Fantastique*. In this work, the composer vividly portrays his obsession with his beloved through music. This work is a hallmark in symphonic music because Berlioz expanded the boundaries of the traditional symphony. The concert will also feature student soloists selected to perform with the orchestra in the biannual music department concerto/aria competition.

The Bus Stop by Gao Xingjian. The ground-breaking 1983 comedy by Nobel Prize winner Gao Xingjian. Condemned as "spiritual pollution" by Chinese Communist Party officials and banned from production, the controversial play, which recalls Beckett's *Waiting for Godot*, earned Gao a reputation as a radical. Critic Martin Denton says "the difference between Gao's play and Beckett's is that, eventually, [in *The Bus Stop*] they learn...he makes hope not just a dream but something palpable and attainable," nytheater.com. DIRECTIONS

FROM POINTS NORTH OR SOUTH

Take I-81 to exit 251. Turn left (south) on US Route 11. At first stoplight, make a right (west) on Mt. Clinton Pike. Continue through two more stoplights (crossing railroad tracks). EMU's campus is directly before you, on the northern side (right side) of Mt. Clinton Pike. Take a right on Smith Avenue. The Seminary building is the first building on your left; ample parking is available.

FROM WEST VIRGINIA AND POINTS WEST

Drive I-64 East (portions toll) to Lexington, Va. Merge onto I-81 North (toward Winchester). Drive to exit 251, the last of four Harrisonburg exits. Turn left (south) on US Route 11. At first stoplight, make a right (west) on Mt. Clinton Pike. Continue through two more stoplights

(crossing railroad tracks). EMU's campus is directly before you, on the northern side (right side) of Mt. Clinton Pike. Take a right on Smith Avenue. The Seminary building is the first building on your left; ample parking is available.

FROM RICHMOND, VA., AND POINTS EAST

Drive I-64 West to Waynesboro. Merge onto I-81 North (toward Winchester) to exit 251, the last of four Harrisonburg exits. Turn left (south) on US Route 11. At first stoplight, make a right (west) on Mt. Clinton Pike. Continue through two more stoplights (crossing railroad tracks). EMU's campus is directly before you, on the northern side (right side) of Mt. Clinton Pike. Take a right on Smith Avenue. The Seminary building is the first building on your left; ample parking is available.

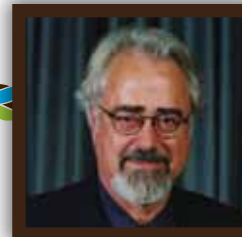
